1875 The College is founded in Smyrna, Asia Minor. as the American Collegiate Institute by Congregational women missionaries from Massachusetts. Its mission was to educate girls of Greek, Armenian. Jewish and Turkish backgrounds who were routinely denied access

EDWARD C. WINGENBACH

Edward Wingenbach became the eighth president of The American College of Greece in 2025, bringing more than 30 years of experience leading institutions of higher education that combine academic innovation with social responsibility.

Before joining ACG, he was president of Hampshire College in Massachusetts, a pioneering liberal arts institution and member of the renowned Five Colleges Consortium with Amherst, Mount Holyoke, Smith, and the University of Massachusetts. At Hampshire, he oversaw a period of renewal: student enrollment rose dramatically, fundraising reached record levels, and the College adopted a bold new curriculum focused on student and faculty addressing the world's pressing challenges. Under his leadership, Hampshire also became one of the only higher education campuses in the world to achieve full carbon neutrality.




Earlier in his career, Dr. Wingenbach served in senior leadership roles at Ripon College in Wisconsin and the University of Redlands in California, where he advanced academic programs, financial sustainability, and international partnerships.

A scholar of democratic theory, he is the author of *Institutionalizing Agonistic Democracy* and has published widely in political science and philosophy.

He earned his undergraduate degree from Lake Forest College and his doctorate from the University of Notre Dame. He now lives in Athens with his spouse, Susan Rice, and their son Thelan, and is honored to join the ACG community during its 150th anniversary year.

ACADEMICATTIRF

Late in the 19th century, American Colleges and universities revived the traditional practices of medieval academic attire. Since that time some standardization in designing academic regalia has been accepted.

The bachelor's gown has arm-length sleeves and is always closed in front. The master's gown has pointed sleeves that are slit at the elbows. The doctor's gown has wide lapels of velvet, in either black or the color of the scholar's specialization. The sleeves of the doctoral gown are full and bell-shaped, with three velvet chevrons in either black or colored like the lapels. Gowns are usually black, although some universities have designed their own bearing the color of the institution. The hood, which drapes over the back of the gown, carries the greatest symbolism of all the components of the academic costume. Its length, width, color of trim and color or colors of the lining denote the wearer's highest academic achievement. The color or the hood's border indicates the scholar's major field of study; the lining color or colors identifies the institution that conferred the degree. The traditional cap is a mortarboard, although the tam and the Elizabethan are seen on some of the faculty. The tassel is often black, although it is frequently gold for the doctorate.

At the start of the inauguration ceremony, President Edward C. Wingenbach will be wearing the doctoral regalia of University of Notre Dame, his alma mater. He will don the presidential regalia of The American College of Greece following the administration of the oath of office.

THE MACE

The mace has been used by colleges and universities as a traditional symbol of authority since the 17th century, when the custom was established at Oxford and Cambridge universities in England. Traditionally, the mace bearer precedes the president of an institution and the platform party upon entering and departing from a ceremony. As the inauguration of President Edward C. Wingenbach is an academic gathering, the honor of bearing the mace of The American College of Greece is offered to a senior faculty member.

THE PRESIDENTIAL MEDALLION

In the Middle Ages, medallions made of gold, silver or bronze became an element or civil and academic ceremonial garb, symbolizing high office. The American College of Greece medallion is an Ilias Lalaounis creation designed for the inauguration of President David G. Horner. The circular oxidated silver medallion bears the name or The American College of Greece's founding (1875) and the two cities in which it has operated: Smyrna (1875-1922) and Athens (1923-present). In the center of the medallion is the open book with the Greek letters A and Ω on its opposing pages, symbolizing the breadth of knowledge offered at ACG as well as the College's deep roots in Greece and the Hellenic civilization. Underneath the open book is ACG's motto—the biblical "Non ministrari sed ministrare," meaning "Not to he served but to serve"—which was chosen by ACG's founders and reflects the College's continuing mission.
